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Skilled Nursing Facilities (SNFs) / Nursing Homes

A nursing home (also referred to as a Skilled Nursing Facility) provides 24-hour skilled nursing care, including room and board, for five or more unrelated individuals that require long-term care support. Nursing homes may provide rehabilitation services at an inpatient or outpatient basis. Some facilities offer specialized units to meet the specific needs of individuals, such as dementia care units. Nursing homes may offer short-term respite options. The Wisconsin Department of Health Services licenses nursing homes. Payment options include Medicare, Medicaid, private/self-pay, private insurance, or Veteran funding.
