

1. Judging Day (Individual Conference Judging) – **Monday, August 24**, from noon-6pm in the Exhibition Building.
2. Release Day – **Sunday, August 30**, between 6pm and 7:30pm. Vehicle access begins at 6:30pm. **Vehicle access will begin at 6:30pm through the northwest corner of the Main Parking lot (across the street from Meijer). Watch for signs. Line Up begins at 6:25pm.** Exhibits released prior to release date and time will not receive premiums.
3. No changes will be allowed after registration forms are submitted.
4. **Four (4) exhibits per class per exhibitor.**
5. **One (1) entry/exhibit per lot number.**
6. Entry tags must be stapled to the lower left hand corner. Identify all “any other” exhibit on entry tag and registration form.
7. All grain varieties must be identified by the exhibitor and must be of this year’s crop, with the exception of wheat entries.
8. All grain will be disposed of after the fair by the superintendent.
9. Plates will be provided.
10. **No override entries allowed or they will be disqualified and discarded on judging day by the judge/superintendent due to possible insect infestation. Any crops that become override during the course of the fair will be discarded by any superintendent or fair board member.**
11. Any items not picked up by the Monday following fair will be discarded.

CLASS A: FIELD CROPS AND ACTIVITIES

Sheaves of hay must measure six (6) inches in diameter at butt end. Sheaves of grain must measure four (4) inches in diameter at butt end.

Premiums for Classes A through E are as Follows:

CLASS D: GARDEN BOX DISPLAY

1. Open to any youth enrolled in a garden project or doing equivalent work.
2. Any vegetable which is grown in your garden is eligible to be included in your display.
3. Garden Boxes will be furnished by Expo.
4. The following numbers of specimens of each vegetable should be exhibited if that vegetable constitutes part of the display:
 - a) 1 specimen – cabbage, cauliflower, eggplant, pie pumpkin, squash (winter), watermelon, broccoli, muskmelon, chard (1 plant).
 - b) 1" cluster of herb, properly identified and cut.
 - c) 2 specimens – celery, cucumbers (slicing and ripe), rutabaga, squash (summer), squash (table queen).
 - d) 3 specimens – beets, carrots, onions, parsnips, peppers (sweet), ripe tomatoes, turnips, sweet corn, kohlrabi, potatoes.
 - e) 6 specimens – peppers (hot), radish, salsify, cucumber (dill), cucumbers (pickling).
 - f) 1 pint – Include one of the following: beans (dry, navy, kidney) or ground cherry (husked) or peas (dry shelled).
 - g) 8 pods – snap peas or garden peas.
