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What is Dementia?

It is NOT normal aging

Dementia is a brain disorder that describes a series of symptoms impacting an individual's daily activities due to cognitive changes. Common signs and symptoms include:



- Poor judgement
- Difficulty completing tasks and carrying on a conversation
- Confusion with date and time
- Mood changes
- Misplacing items and unable to retrace steps
- Withdrawal from activities

Gradual Changes VS. Sudden Onset



Typically, in cases of dementia, early symptoms tend to emerge gradually over a period of time, around 1 to 2 years. However, if the onset is abrupt, occurring within a week to a few months, it could be attributed to an infection (example: urinary tract infection) or vitamin deficiencies.

What is “Normal Aging”?



There are age-related changes that become apparent as our brains age alongside our bodies. We may occasionally forget to pay a bill on time, lose track of the day only to recall it later, struggle to find the right words, or misplace items from time to time. However, these occurrences are completely normal.



Know the 10 Warning Signs

The Alzheimer's Association has developed a list of warning signs for Alzheimer's disease and other forms of dementia to aid in the early identification process. Individuals may experience one or more of these signs to varying extents. If you or someone you care about is experiencing any of these symptoms, it is crucial to consult a doctor for a proper assessment. Early diagnosis allows you to pursue treatment options and make plans for your future.

Alzheimer's Association 10 Signs

1. Memory loss that disrupts daily life
2. Challenges in planning or solving problems
3. Difficulty completing familiar tasks
4. Confusion with time or place
5. Trouble understanding visual images and spatial relationships
6. New problems with words in speaking or writing
7. Misplacing things and losing the ability to retrace steps
8. Decreased or poor judgement
9. Withdrawal from work or social activities
10. Changes in mood and personality

Getting a Definitive Diagnosis

When You Start To Notice Changes

If you begin to notice changes that disrupt your daily life (i.e. not “normal aging”), reach out to your doctor to explore potential options or resources available to you. Additionally, consider undergoing a cognitive screening. These brief assessments are not diagnostic, but can help identify certain cognitive changes. They are free at the ADRC, simply call to schedule an appointment with the Dementia Care Specialist.

Finding a Specialist/Getting a Diagnosis

It is crucial to address questions you have with your doctor regarding a potential dementia diagnosis. Once your doctor has ruled out other medical conditions that might mimic dementia-like symptoms, consider requesting a referral to a specialist for a comprehensive evaluation.

Specialists in geriatrics, psychology, or neuropsychology can help explore additional options and provide a definitive diagnosis. Here are some memory clinics helpful in diagnosing dementia:

After the Diagnosis

Once a diagnosis of dementia or related cognitive impairments are made, several resources and support systems are available for you!

Education

Virtual Dementia Tour (VDT):

An in-person educational program that provides an evidence-informed simulation of what dementia may feel like. This unique experience will alter your senses, challenge your brain, and offer a profound insight into dementia. The VDT is a transformative experience to enhance your caregiving skills.

Dementia 101 & 201:

The Dementia Care Specialist conducts presentations covering a range of topics related to dementia and Alzheimer's disease. Subjects include everything from the "Basics of Dementia" to "How to Handle Behaviors."

Boost Your Brain and Memory:

An instructor-led class that takes a holistic and evidence-based approach to enhancing brain health. You will learn new habits aimed at supporting cognitive health and practice skills designed to improve memory performance. This program is specifically intended for individuals who **have not been diagnosed** with dementia, to learn ways they can reduce their risk.

Memory Cafés

Memory Cafés welcome those experiencing early-stage dementia, mild memory loss, or cognitive impairment, as well as their family and friends. Below is a list of local memory cafés.

Support Groups

Early Stage Support Group:

This support group assists families and friends in coping by having two simultaneous sessions: One for caregivers and another for care recipients diagnosed with early-stage cognitive impairment. It provides emotional support, practical advice, and fosters a sense of community. Please note that an assessment is required prior to attending.

Dementia Care Specialist Program

The Dementia Care Specialist (DCS) serves as a valuable resource for both individuals with dementia and their caregiver.

Supporting Individuals with Dementia

The DCS provides complimentary cognitive screenings for those who are noticing changes in their cognition and memory. While these screenings are not diagnostic, they can help establish a baseline for memory impairment and guide you towards obtaining a respectful diagnosis.

Supporting Family Caregivers

DCS professionals can guide family caregivers with care planning, exploring options, or understanding more about dementia to provide the best care for their loved ones.

Additionally, support groups and family consultations are valuable resources offered to caregivers through the DCS program. Families can also take advantage of the Memory Cafés as a social activity to engage with their loved ones.

Supporting the Community

The DCS assists in the vital role of fostering dementia-friendly communities through initiatives such as Memory Cafés, educational programs, Purple Angel Business Trainings, or other forms of educational opportunities. The DCS program serves as your resource for community education on dementia.





Become Dementia-Friendly

The Purple Angel Initiative

To assist members of our community diagnosed with dementia in maintaining their daily routines, we offer the Purple Angel training to local businesses!

This training targets both business owners and their employees. It will equip them with knowledge to interact appropriately with their patrons displaying early signs of dementia or those who have already received a diagnosis.

This training includes 30 minutes of general education and how to communicate with an individual who has early signs of dementia. Upon completion of the training, participating businesses receive the “Purple Angel” decal (as seen below) to display on their storefront, along with a certificate of completion.

Future Planning: POAs

As caregivers, it is crucial for you to plan ahead - not just for your loved ones, but for yourselves as well! One effective approach is to prepare advanced directives documents. A Power of Attorney (POA) is a legal document that grants one individual the authority to act on behalf of another. The two most common types of POAs are:

- POA of Healthcare
- POA of Finances
